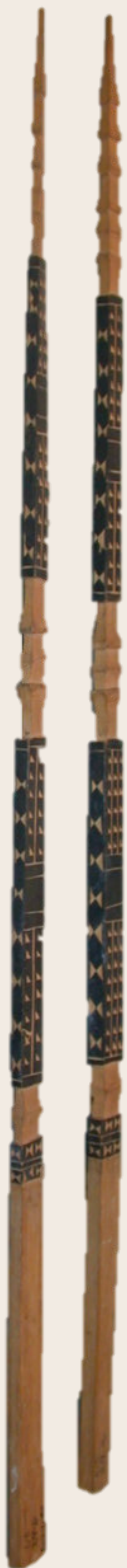


FÁIRO RESPECT

What is fáiro?

Fáiro is defined as be bowing; be respectful.

Goodenough, 1980

Fáiro according to the late Kintoky Joseph is a traditional way of living. It is a set of harmonious principles that define and give guidance to individuals and society.

Rayphand, 2014

Fairo comes from two words *fai* (under) and *ro* (bow).

Fáiro (under brow or under arc of heaven) people are assembled under the aegis of the arc of heaven and also under the aegis of the Fáiro.

Respect is one of the central concepts in island culture; the word is forever being used in the islands.

Respect, the paramount value in Micronesian society, is communicated by deference: by speaking quietly and often lowering one's eyes; by trying not to "stand above" another; or even trying not to stand out from the crowd.

Landy, 2019

Fáiro is the foundation of the life of a Chuukese man or woman – is depicted by humility, wisdom, & love.

Manuel, 2017

Showing respect is a key component of Micronesian culture.

Raatior, 2017

Respect is a core Chuukese value that serves to harmonize and regulate relationships among people and with nature.

Why is fáiro important to a Chuukese person?

- It is the signature of a peaceful or harmonious life.
- It strengthens Chuukese culture, values, and practices.
- It is the signature of a Chuukese man or a Chuukese woman, shown through hospital receptions and when paying respect at funerals.
